a place for SUMMORS

Since 1975, MOCSA has been a place for survivors and our mission and vision have been clear:

To improve the lives of those impacted by sexual abuse and assault and to prevent sexual violence in our community. Together we can create a community free from sexual abuse and assault.

As the only rape crisis center serving the six-county metro area, MOCSA has been a place where more than 60,000 individuals receive advocacy, counseling, prevention, and education services each year. All completely free of charge. For almost 50 years, MOCSA's donor community has stood with survivors. And today, we need YOU to take the next step with us in this journey.

a place for healing

When someone calls MOCSA's crisis line after a sexual assault, they receive immediate assistance that starts with advocacy at the hospital and continues throughout the survivor's healing process.

More than 25 therapists trained in evidence-based trauma treatment provide therapy to survivors of sexual violence of all ages. We approach therapy holistically and individually, depending on the needs of the survivor.

As the only organization in Kansas City supporting survivors through the crime of sexual violence, the success of our programs means we need to expand our space so we can continue meeting the needs of our community.

a place to **be safe**

MOCSA wants children and adults in our community to be safe from sexual violence because no one should even need MOCSA's services.

School programs offer developmentallyappropriate, research-driven curricula for ages 4 through 18, educating students in over 30 school districts throughout the metro.

MOCSA provides education and training to professionals, too. From law enforcement to bars and restaurants, to parents and neighborhoods, we want to share the best tools with our neighbors to keep them safe.

Our prevention team spends time in our communities working with local partners and neighborhood coalitions to identify and implement plans to decrease violence.



MOCSA has grown significantly over the last decade, more than **tripling** resources and staff to meet the needs of our community. With nearly **100 staff,** we are the **largest** rape crisis center in the nation, and a local and regional leader in providing resources to the community and support to survivors. We have outgrown our current office space and need a new home to support and continue our growth and impact in the Kansas City metro.

MOCSA's new home will be at 6500 Euclid Avenue in Kansas City, Missouri. This building will provide us with more space to continue serving our community, while also offering an accessible, survivor-centric, and trauma-informed space.


Once renovated, our new building will more than double our physical capacity and will be Kansas City's first space developed specifically for programs to support survivors and prevent sexual violence.

In addition to providing more room for community partnership, training and collaboration, the new facility will expand the private specialized spaces survivors need. This includes rooms for therapy, art, yoga, group sessions, outdoor spaces, and children's spaces. This beautiful, serene, and private campus will be a physical symbol of the community's support for survivors of sexual abuse and assault.

Why here? Because we want to be in the heart of the community and working together to end sexual violence. This place is:

- » centrally located in our service area
- » easily accessible from Highway 71
- » close to public transportation
- » in an area at high risk for child sexual abuse
